We were hoping that COVID-19 restrictions may have allowed us to meet face-to-face but this was not the case. Despite the challenges of 28 people meeting online we achieved a lot and it was vital to reconnect.

We were lucky enough to have a presentation from Travis Bover, Assistant Secretary Drought Preparedness and Policy from the Australian Government's Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment. Travis stepped us through the elements of the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund. He encouraged CMAs to engage in the process and it was pleasing to know that CMAs are acknowledged as a key delivery agency for significant parts of the program. We also had presentations from Angela Avery and Mel Cann from Agriculture Victoria. Mel has been coordinating the agriculture component of the Victorian Government's Working for Victoria employment stimulus program (see photos below). Mel thanked the CMAs for their efforts in supporting the program. CMAs are on track to have at least 120 people employed through the agriculture program. Angela is the Research Director of Agriculture Victoria's Agriculture Research Sciences and she outlined some exciting initiatives as part of their Smart Farming program, which CMAs have been and will continue to be involved in.

We also discussed The Observership Program that some CMAs have participated in. The Observership Program facilitates the involvement of young, talented and energetic individuals in a structured experience on non-profit Boards. Each Observer is paired with an organisation for 12 months. Those that have participated have found the program to be a very positive experience and it was acknowledged that this could be a way to contribute to succession planning for CMA Boards.
